WELCOME VERY IMPORTANT CHANGES FOR 2021

Changes for 2021 Programme

Just prior to sending this brochure to print the Trustees and I were faced with the dilemma of how we should present the programme for this year's festival.

Although the signs were that things were beginning to look more hopeful, it was by no means certain we would be able to operate as usual, with the church full to capacity. Even if regulations allowed us to proceed in that way, the complete unknown was - how happy would people be sitting very close together in a crowded space?

Also, because of the nature of the building exiting and re-entering during intervals cannot be done without large bottle necks forming.

If we sold tickets as usual with most concerts selling out, and then at the last minute had to observe social distancing, how on earth would we decide who can use their tickets and who has to surrender them and accept a refund. If we sold based on a socially distanced plan, we could only get about a third of the usual number in for each concert. We could have live-streamed for everyone else but, whereas some might be happy watching the occasional concert, how many of those who come to a great number, or even the whole festival would want to sit in front of a screen for 13 consecutive evenings?

In the end we felt the only satisfactory and most sure way to proceed was to have a socially distanced seating plan, ask most of the artists to shorten their programmes slightly, and perform them twice on the same day, once in the afternoon and once in the evening. That way we can give about 300 people per day the chance to attend a 'live' concert, seated in a way the majority, hopefully, will feel very comfortable with, and the shorter concerts remove the need for an interval and all the problems that gives us.

Although limiting sales to a maximum of 150 per concert will have a fairly large

financial impact, we have decided that, where the programmes have been shortened, we will reduce the cost of the tickets for those concerts. We feel we want to extend this gesture of goodwill to everyone as a way of thanking you all for the amazing support you gave us and the musicians over the cancellation of the 2020 festival. The trustees have decided that the shortfall caused by the smaller numbers and lower prices can be covered by our reserves.

Changes to Ticketing

We have made the decision to move away from physical tickets. This is something we had been considering for a while but the Covid19 crisis prompted us to finally make the move. We feel that the more we can to do eliminate the handling of tickets & programmes etc the safer it is for everyone. To enable the new system to work, all bookings will be processed electronically and you will automatically receive an email

confirming payment and listing the tickets allocated to you. All you need to do is to print out the email and that will be your ticket. If you prefer, you can just keep the email on your phone and present that on the door. We will have a list on the door of all bookings for each concert. This system also ensures that, should the need arise, we automatically have contact details for all attendees. NB - for those of you who do not have an email address, we will post you confirmation of the tickets allocated. This will be a time consuming process so please avoid us having to do this if you possibly can. Payment - we understand that some of you still like to use cheques but processing sales electronically will be far simpler for us if you put your credit or debit card numbers on the booking form.

Changes to Unreserved Tickets

Finally, we have done away with unreserved tickets. All the seats that were previously in that category will now be numbered but priced at the same level as the unreserved seats used to be. We think this will be an aid to getting everyone seated quickly.

20th Anniversary Festival

Although the 2020 festival, along with just about every event last year, was cancelled, 2021 is our 20th year of putting on (or attempting to put on) a festival. So, given that we all need something to celebrate, we are calling this year our 20th anniversary festival.

With the level of uncertainty in the early part of this year we took the decision to move to September for this year's festival. All things being equal we will return to our usual time of May for the 2022 festival.

Given the quite extraordinary level of generosity shown by our supporters over the cancelled 2020 festival, we go into 2021 in a sound financial state which means that, although we of course still need financial support to put on the 2021 programme, we have not had to lower our sights at all over the artists programmed. In fact, I believe this year's line-up is one of the strongest we have ever presented.

Because the 2021 programme was all confirmed by the end of 2019, it meant we weren't able to invite back for this year many of the cancelled 2020 players, but

where an artist original booked for May 2021 was unable to offer a September date, we have taken the opportunity to replace them with an ensemble from the 2020 programme, and so we are able to have the delayed Festival debuts of Camerata RCO, and La Serenissima. Also making festival debuts this year are the Cuartetto Casals with a wonderful programme of Haydn & Mozart. and Ex Cathedra, who will be closing this year's festival with a beautiful programme entitled Baroque Passion.

For logistical reasons the move to September means that the Festival Academy Orchestra will be with us for all of week one rather than week two.

I look forward to seeing many of you in September.

SEASON TICKETS

We now have three categories of season ticket. Season A ticket, which gives a top priced reserved seat for all concerts, Season B ticket which gives a second priced reserved seat for all concerts, and the Season C ticket which gives a third priced reserved seat for all concerts. Patrons' and Friends' season ticket applications will be processed in the appropriate priority period and General season tickets will be processed just prior to other General bookings. NB Some third priced tickets have restricted sightlines.

PRIORITY BOOKING

The number of people signing up for the priority booking schemes grows every year and, increasingly, it is the only sure way of obtaining tickets for the most popular concerts. To ensure that all members of these schemes benefit from joining we put a maximum on the number of tickets that can be purchased for the orchestral concerts, which this year will be on the 7th 9th 10th 11th 14th 16th. Full details are on the Patrons, Friends, & Sponsors page at the rear of this brochure. As always, we will operate the traditional postal system for the Patrons', Friends' & Season priority booking periods, and for those who like to get their General booking form in early. As soon as all the postal bookings have been processed we will then activate, in early August, the online booking system.

SUPPORTING YOUNG TALENT

As a charity, the festival is seriously committed to music education.

The 'Chipping Campden Festival Academy' orchestra, formed in 2008, has become an extremely significant part of the festival. The Academy is formed anew every year (although many of the professionals are regular members) and each desk has an advanced conservatoire student or recent graduate playing alongside an experienced Pro. This gives the young artists an invaluable insight into what playing in a professional orchestra entails. How wonderful to be able to celebrate the return of the Chipping Campden Festival! The Festival, and in particular its Director Charlie Bennett, rightly made national headlines last year by keeping faith with the artists whose concerts were unavoidably cancelled and paying their fees in any case - something that was only made possible by this Festival's generous-spirited audience. It was a time of great hardship for many musicians and this unique act of kindness will not be forgotten.

On the music education front this has also been an extraordinary year. While I was pleased to serve on the panel which produced the government's long-awaited Model Music Curriculum, which should certainly be helpful in re-introducing music to schools where there is currently very little, it was disappointing that the same government department (!) should also announce a 50% cut in support for arts-based

subjects at university level. More joined-up thinking please!

Meanwhile the Festival's commitment to music education remains at the core of its mission. Sadly, we could not run the Youth Academy course this summer (hopefully this will be returning next year) but the main Festival Orchestra's 'side-by-side' project - whereby professionals sit alongside students - will run as usual in the three big orchestral concerts. All the Academy members who missed out in 2020 have been invited back for this year's festival so they will still be receiving this invaluable orchestral experience.

Despite the vicissitudes thrown its way, the Chipping Campden Festival remains in rude health - as the 2021 programme testifies. I am sure there will be an even greater sense of anticipation this year when Festival President Paul Lewis takes to the stage on September 6th."

Festival regulars will know how superbly put together Lucy's composer portraits are and I was so pleased she was able to come back this year along with the brilliant Harriet Walter to present her latest one.

Clara Schumann was a truly exceptional woman, not just a devoted wife to the composer Robert Schumann, but a groundbreaking musician in her own right. Over a period of 60 years she gave over 1,500 concerts and determined the format of the kind of piano recital that is familiar to us today.

As a child prodigy, she was groomed for stardom by her pianoteacher father, Friedrich Wieck. By the age of eight she was dazzling audiences throughout Europe. Having married Robert against her father's wishes, she became the mother of eight children. When her husband declined tragically into mental illness and an attempt at suicide, she continued both to run the household and to make an international concert career to support the family.

She was also a talented composer, producing a piano concerto, numerous solo piano works, chamber music and songs.

The narrative, scripted by Lucy Parham and drawn from letters and diaries, is interspersed with live performances of her works, and of music by Robert Schumann, Brahms, Liszt, Mendelssohn, and Chopin.

SPONSORS OF AN ORCHESTRAL CHAIR AND FRIENDS OF THE ACADEMY ORCHESTRA

The idea of creating the 'Chipping Campden Festival Academy' orchestra in 2008 was to give talented young musicians from the UK's conservatoires, or recent graduates, an opportunity to work alongside the finest professional musicians. The project has grown each year and is now recognised as one of the leading 'side by side' training orchestra in the UK. To ensure the highest standards of quality the Academy orchestra comprises 50% experienced orchestral musicians and 50% of 'Academy' trainees. Each string, woodwind, and brass 'desk' seats one professional and one 'Academy' trainee together. In three concerts during the festival the CCFAO perform with soloists of international standing and although these concerts normally sell out, the cost of presenting them greatly exceeds the box office take. Typically, we lose about £25,000 on these three concerts so, even with the generous support of the Orchestra's main sponsor we still have to provide a substantial subsidy. Whilst the festival has always been happy to take on this commitment, the more financially viable we can make the orchestra

in the future, the more funds we will have to expand our educational work into other areas.


In 2014 we launched the 'sponsor a chair' scheme to help raise funds for this project. A generous donor has already committed to sponsoring our conductor for 2021 and beyond but we are still looking for people prepared to sponsor our orchestra leader (£1,500), a professional player (£1,000) or an Academy member (£500). Or you can become a 'Friend of the Academy Orchestra' for a minimum donation of £100.

Chair sponsors get a 3 week priority-booking period and for the three orchestral concerts on the 7th, 9th & 11th can purchase up to a maximum of 8 tickets

'Friends' get a one week priority period and for the concerts on 7th, 9th & 11th can purchase up to a maximum of 4 tickets

Everyone will be acknowledged in the programme unless they wish to remain anonymous. You will be invited to the 'Sponsors' Champagne reception on the afternoon of Sunday September 19th.

The system operates as follows

- As each priority booking period opens forms are processed in the order in which donations were received.
- Patrons' and Friends' season ticket applications will be processed in the appropriate priority period.
- General season tickets will be processed just prior to other General bookings.
- General booking forms will be processed in the order in which they were received.
 We will then activate the online booking system in early August.

So, regardless of the category your form is in please return it ASAP. The sooner we get your form the better chance you have of getting the tickets you want.

Forms can be posted or delivered by hand to our office in the Old Police Station in Chipping Campden High Street. Hand delivered post can be left in the Festival post box on the ground floor next to the lift. Because about 90% of tickets are sold during the early postal booking periods, and then online, a physical box office is only open during the period of the festival itself. At this time tickets will be on sale from our office on the second floor of the Old Police Station. The box office is normally open from 11am-2pm each festival day apart from weekends. However, it is dependent on volunteers, so there may be odd moments when it is not open.

If you find the office closed please leave booking forms in our post box on the ground floor next to the lift and we will process them as soon as possible.

At all other times please call the enquiry line 01386 849018. If we are not there please leave a message and we will call you back.

You will receive an email confirming payment and listing the tickets allocated to you. All you need to do is to print out the email and that will be your ticket. If you prefer, you can just keep the email on your phone and present that on the door. We will have a list on the door of all bookings for each concert. This system also ensures that, should the need arise, we automatically have contact details for all attendees.

NB - for those of you who do not have an email address, we will post you confirmation of the tickets allocated. This will be a time consuming process so please avoid us having to do this if you possibly can.

NB - Please remember to indicate on the booking form whether you will accept tickets for the day's other performance if your first choice is not available.

Save up to 40% off the full prices!

Season A.

A top price seat for all concerts. The full value is £490 but these are offered at £343 - 30% discount.

Season B.

A second price seat for all concerts. The full value is £420 but these are offered at £294 - 30% discount.

Season C.

A third price seat for all concerts. The full value is £330 but these are offered at £198 - 40% discount.

NB - Please indicate on the booking form whether you are booking for early or late performances.

All seating will be socially distanced and if your booking includes people not in your household you must be happy to be all seated together.

We respectfully request that you sit only in the seats allocated to you. Moving to any other 'empty' seats will not be allowed.

Tickets are not refundable, except in the case of cancellation of a performance. We make every endeavour to ensure that works performed are as advertised, but artists reserve the right to alter their programmes and no refunds can be made on the basis of them playing a different programme from the one advertised.

We accept tickets for resale only when performances are completely sold out. If we succeed in reselling tickets, an administration charge of £5 will be made per pair of tickets. Please contact the box office 01386 849018 or email charlie@campdenmusicfestival.co.uk

This is our top level of Festival supporter. Business logos or individual's names will appear in the souvenir programme book (unless you wish to remain anonymous) and there will be a 'Patrons and Friends' champagne reception on the afternoon of Sunday September 19th. You will be given a 3 week priority booking period before the box office opens to the general public.

Patron for 2021 – a minimum donation of £500. For the concerts on the 7th, 9th, 10th, 11th, 14th & 16th there is a maximum purchase limit of 8 tickets.

We have two levels of 'Friends' membership. Gold Friends get a two-week priority booking period and Silver Friends a one-week priority period. All names will appear in the souvenir programme book (unless you wish to remain anonymous) and you will be invited to the 'Patrons and Friends' Champagne reception on the afternoon of Sunday September 19th.

Gold Friend for 2021 – a minimum donation of £300. For the concerts on the 7th, 9th, 10th, 11th, 14th & 16th there is a maximum purchase limit of 6 tickets.

Silver Friend for 2021 – a minimum donation of £100. For the concerts on the 7th, 9th, 10th, 11th, 14th & 16th there is a maximum purchase limit of 4 tickets.

We appreciate that not everyone is in a position to join the Patrons or Friends schemes but anything you feel able to donate will make a difference to our ability to continue presenting concerts of the highest standard and, equally importantly, to run our ever growing educational programme. You can add the amount to your booking form in the section headed 'Other donations'.

Online booking will open on Monday 2 August.


